
Doors Open Days is Scotland's largest free festival that celebrates places and stories, new and old. Every September you can explore hundreds of fascinating buildings across Scotland for free. Some open up once a year, some just once in a lifetime.

This year Doors Open Days invited our visitors to play 'tourist' in their own town for free.

Doors Open Days is coordinated nationally by the Scottish Civic Trust and is part of European Heritage Days alongside Scottish Archaeology Month, coordinated by Archaeology Scotland. Both are supported by Historic Environment Scotland. A dedicated team of regional coordinators across Scotland work closely with venues and groups to develop local programmes for their communities.
